## Executive Summary

### AP-05 Executive Summary - 91.200(c), 91.220(b)

#### 1. Introduction

The City of Pembroke Pines developed a Five-year Consolidated Plan to address the housing and community development needs of its low- and moderate-income residents, including those at risk of or currently experiencing homelessness. This Plan establishes the City's priorities and sets measurable goals that serve as the foundation for the Annual Action Plan, which outlines annual activities and the allocation of federal grant funds.

Since becoming an entitlement grantee in 1993, Pembroke Pines has been a recipient of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. The City has also participated in the Broward County HOME Consortium since 2004, leveraging the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) to support housing objectives, and utilizes the State Housing Initiative Partnership (SHIP) Program to support affordable housing and related services.

The City maintains and enhances its communities through a coordinated approach integrating the Consolidated Plan, Comprehensive Plan, Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), annual budgeting, special redevelopment studies, grants, and intergovernmental coordination. The Annual Action Plan is developed through a review of existing programs, consultation with service providers, interdepartmental consultation, and citizen participation.

#### 2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The Annual Action Plan establishes the City's priority objectives and anticipated outcomes for the program year. These priorities are based on housing, fair housing and community development needs identified in the Five-Year Consolidated Plan, as well as local conditions and service demands.

##### **Priority I – Housing Rehabilitation**

- Provide assistance for minor home repair and rehabilitation of owner-occupied housing units to help maintain safe, decent, and accessible living conditions.
- This supports the preservation of affordable housing and improves overall housing quality for low- and moderate-income households.

##### **Priority II – Public Facility and Infrastructure Improvements**

- Improve infrastructure, including roads, sidewalks, drainage systems, and water and sewer facilities in eligible areas.

- Support improvements to public facilities such as parks and community spaces to enhance access and usability for residents.
- The City may also consider assistance for eligible low- and moderate-income households in areas impacted by county-led sewer expansion projects to transition from septic systems to municipal sewer service, subject to funding availability and program requirements.
- These efforts are intended to improve neighborhood conditions, public health, and access to essential infrastructure.

### **Priority III – Public Services/Supportive Services**

- Support services for vulnerable populations, including elderly persons, individuals with disabilities, households experiencing economic hardship, victims of domestic violence, and individuals in need of mental health or substance use recovery services.
- Provide outreach and education related to fair housing rights and available housing programs, particularly in eligible census tracts.
- These efforts are intended to improve access to services, support housing stability, and increase awareness of fair housing protections.

### **3. Evaluation of past performance**

The City’s most recently completed program year is used to evaluate past performance and inform the selection of goals and projects in the Annual Action Plan. This evaluation considers housing, infrastructure, and public service activities funded through CDBG and other applicable resources.

Assistance to low- and moderate-income households has remained a consistent priority carried forward from the previous Five-Year Consolidated Plan, focused on housing rehabilitation and public services. These objectives were addressed through the following completed activities:

- Minor Home Repair/Residential Rehabilitation: 3 households assisted
- Public Service, primarily senior transportation assistance: 20,179 trips provided to 678 senior residents
- Public Facility Improvements: Safety and building system upgrades completed at Pines Place Senior Residences, including fire alarm and generator system improvements, with elevator modernization initiated to enhance long-term accessibility.

### **4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process**

According to federal regulation 24 CFR 570.431, applicants for federal funds, including entitlement jurisdictions, must develop a Citizen Participation Plan (CPP). The CPP sets forth the City's policies and procedures for:

- 1) Providing timely notice and public access to meetings, hearings, and materials related to the use of federal funds;
- 2) Offering technical assistance to groups representative of low- and moderate-income persons;
- 3) Conducting public hearings to obtain citizen input;
- 4) Ensuring meaningful access for non-English speaking residents and persons with disabilities;
- 5) Responding to citizen complaints and grievances in a timely manner;
- 6) Encouraging citizen participation, particularly by low- and moderate-income residents, including those living in areas designated as slum or blighted;

The City’s existing Citizen Participation Plan was reviewed and applied in the preparation of the 2026 Annual Action Plan and 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan. Public involvement was encouraged through hearings held at key stages, including prior development of the draft plan and prior to its adoption by the City Commission. The draft Annual Acton Plan was made available for public review and comment before it was submitted to HUD.

To ensure inclusivity, reasonable accommodations were made available upon request, including translation services for non-English speakers and accessibility support for individuals with disabilities.

### **1. Introduction**

When preparing the 2026 Annual Action Plan, consultation was conducted with local and regional agencies to assess available services and identify gaps affecting low- and moderate-income residents and other populations. This outreach informed the Needs Assessment and helped identify opportunities for improved coordination among service providers.

**Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction’s activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(l)).**

Coordination included housing providers, health and mental health agencies, and social service organizations serving children, older adults, persons with disabilities, individuals living with HIV/AIDS, and those experiencing or at risk of homelessness. Outreach was conducted primarily through email and telephone communication, requesting information on current services and unmet needs relevant to Pembroke Pines residents.

**Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.**

Participation in the Broward County Continuum of Care (COC) supports regional efforts to address homelessness, including individuals and families, veterans, and youth populations. Coordination includes participation in regional meetings collaboration with the Broward County Homeless Initiative Partnership, which provides data and strategic guidance. Point-in-Time Count data and related homelessness reporting are reviewed as part of ongoing planning efforts.

**Describe consultation with the Continuum(s) of Care that serves the jurisdiction’s area in determining how to allocate ESG funds, develop performance standards for and evaluate outcomes of projects and activities assisted by ESG funds, and develop funding, policies and procedures for the operation and administration of HMIS**

The City of Pembroke Pines does not directly receive or administer Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds. ESG funding is administered through the Ft. Lauderdale/Broward County Continuum of Care (CoC). While the City is not an ESG grantee, it participates in CoC coordination activities related to homelessness planning, performance discussions, and regional service alignment.

CDBG funds do not require a local match. The City may leverage federal funds with other available public and private resources, where applicable, to support community development and affordable housing activities. The City does not currently administer programs with matching requirements; however, it will continue to explore opportunities to combine federal funds with other funding sources.

**If appropriate, describe publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan**

The City maintains an inventory of publicly owned land to assess its potential for affordable housing. In accordance with state requirements, including the Live Local Act, this inventory is periodically reviewed to evaluate potential development opportunities.

The City's current inventory consists primarily of parcels designated for public use, such as parks and streets, or parcels that are not suitable for development due to zoning or physical constraints. As such, no City-owned land is currently considered viable for affordable housing development. The City Commission will continue to review the inventory at least once every three years to assess potential future opportunities in support of Consolidated Plan goals.

### Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

The City of Pembroke Pines allocates its CDBG funds based on an assessment of eligible areas and identified high-priority needs. Funding is directed to eligible low-and moderate-income areas in accordance with HUD requirements and the City's Consolidated Plan. This designation reflects the relatively small proportion and dispersed nature of low- to moderate-income populations within the City compared to other jurisdictions.

Given these parameters, the City prioritizes funding for projects that benefit eligible areas, including infrastructure improvements and public facility enhancements, with the goal of fostering a sustainable and resilient community. The short-term objective is to address decline in older neighborhoods, while the long-term goal focuses on improving quality of life through comprehensive redevelopment efforts.

CDBG funds are aligned with ongoing neighborhood planning, redevelopment, and public service efforts—particularly those supporting seniors and low-income households.— For Program Year 2026, this includes activities such as residential rehabilitation, fair housing education, public services, and public infrastructure improvements

One of the primary obstacles to addressing underserved needs is the limited size and geographic dispersion of the eligible population, which restricts the areas where CDBG funds can be deployed effectively. Nonetheless, the City remains committed to maximizing impact by targeting its resources where they can provide the greatest benefit.

## **AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing -91.420, 91.220(j)**

### **Introduction**

The City of Pembroke Pines Affordable Housing Advisory Committee (AHAC), identifies potential improvements to the housing delivery system, with particular emphasis on the provision of affordable housing to very low and low-income households. Recommendations are documented and subsequently submitted to the City Commission and the Florida Housing Finance Corporation to report the committee's work and findings.

### **Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment**

The following 2025 AHAC recommendations were submitted and adopted by the City Commission as actions intended to reduce or ameliorate regulatory and policy barriers to affordable housing, including land use regulations, zoning standards, and development requirements:

- The City to reduce the minimum permitted floor area for multifamily housing units from 750 square feet to 550 square feet for developments that include affordable housing.
- The City should monitor Broward County's progress on the sewer conversion project and determine the appropriate timing to begin outreach to County Phase residents. In preparation, the Housing Administrator should consider establishing a non-binding resident interest list to help streamline outreach and application distribution once the grants become available.
- The City to continue to provide the AHAC with an annual summary of newly permitted ADUs, including their locations, and evaluate strategies to support increased ADU development.
- The City should continue to actively advocate for future expansions of the Flamingo Road Greenway throughout the County to promote safe, accessible, and sustainable non-automobile transportation options to our residents and visitors.

### **Other AHAC Recommendations:**

- Encourage partnerships with local for-profit and not-for-profit entities to expand affordable housing options, including both rental and homeownership. Where feasible, the City should leverage existing affordable housing funds or grant funding, with an emphasis on assisting low-income residents in securing homeownership or rental opportunities.
- The city to consider developing an ordinance to establish LDC guidelines for affordable housing development that would allow developers to seek site-specific waivers – such as for unit size, parking, height, roadway width, and/or lot configurations – in lieu of variances, as part of the site plan process.

## **AP-85 Other Actions - 91.420, 91.220(k)**

### **Introduction**

The following section identifies other actions that will be undertaken during the 2026 program year to address the needs and challenges identified in the 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan.

### **Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs**

The City faces market-related obstacles, including economic fluctuations, which can affect the availability of affordable housing. To mitigate these challenges, it continually assesses and improves its programs, including housing rehabilitation for low- and moderate-income residents, seniors, and individuals with disabilities. These efforts ensure the City can meet the growing demand for affordable housing and related services despite changing market conditions.

### **Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing**

Led by the Planning & Economic Development Department, the City will continue to foster and maintain affordable housing by administering the 2026 Action Plan and CDBG programs. It will collaborate with agencies such as the Broward County Continuum of Care and local housing authorities to provide affordable housing solutions. A private firm will continue to provide assistance with the execution of the strategies outlined in the 2026 Annual Action Plan, ensuring compliance with federal and state regulations. Efforts will focus on maintaining the current affordable housing stock through rehabilitation and addressing the needs of low- and moderate-income households.

### **Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards**

Lead-based paint hazards will continue to be addressed in rehabilitation projects by notifying property owners of the risks. Before any rehabilitation work is initiated, either paint testing will be performed or painted surfaces will be presumed to contain lead-based paint. The use of lead-based paint is prohibited in federally funded projects, and all applicable federal requirements will be followed, including risk assessments, interim controls, and abatement procedures when required.

### **Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families**

Efforts will focus on reducing the impacts of poverty by improving housing stability and lowering housing-related financial burdens for low- and moderate-income households. Through housing rehabilitation activities, the City assists eligible homeowners in addressing health, safety, and structural deficiencies that they may otherwise be unable to correct due to financial constraints, helping to preserve existing affordable housing and reduce the risk of displacement.

In addition, coordination with regional partners, including the Broward County Continuum of Care, supports homelessness prevention and housing stability initiatives. Collaboration with the Miramar

Pembroke Pines Regional Chamber of Commerce supports broader economic development efforts by fostering connections between local businesses, government, and community partners. These efforts help strengthen the local economic environment and may contribute to increased economic opportunities and access to resources for residents over time.

Collectively, these activities support community stability, reduce conditions associated with economic hardship, and promote long-term livability for low- and moderate-income households.

**Actions planned to develop institutional structure**

To develop and strengthen its institutional structure, the City has competitively procured professional services to assist with the planning, administration, and implementation of the CDBG, SHIP, and HOME programs. A private consultant assists with execution of the strategies outlined in the 2026 Action Plan and ensures compliance with federal and state regulations. The City will also continue to coordinate with local agencies, businesses, and non-profits to carry out housing and community development initiatives.

**Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies**

The City will enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies by collaborating with the Broward County Continuum of Care, local housing authorities, and private entities. These partnerships will streamline the delivery of housing, health, and social services. External consultants will also support implementation and compliance efforts to ensure comprehensive service delivery for low-and moderate-income households.
