- 1. ASSIGNMENT AND ASSUMPTION. Assignor hereby assigns and transfers to Assignee all of Assignor's right, title and interest in and to the Agreement as of the Effective Date.
- 2. ASSUMPTION BY ASSIGNEE. Assignee accepts the foregoing Assignment from Assignor, and hereby assumes all obligations, covenants, duties, and liabilities of Assignor under the Agreement. Assignee further agrees that it shall perform all of the Assignor's original obligations under the Agreement.
- 3. ENFORCEMENT BY CITY. Assignor, Assignee and City hereby acknowledge and agree that there may be obligations, duties, and liabilities contained in the Agreement that are for the benefit of the City, and the City shall be entitled to enforce such duties, obligations, and liabilities contained in the Agreement against Assignee to the same extent and in the same manner as if Assignee had entered into the Agreement with the City on the Effective Date of the Agreement.
- 4. The Assignor, Assignee and City each represent that the undersigned is vested with full authority to execute this Assignment on behalf thereof.
- 5. Each party is hereby authorized to accept and rely upon a facsimile signature or signature transmitted through electronic means of the other party on this Assignment. Any such signature shall be treated as an original signature for all purposes. Each party is hereby authorized to accept and rely upon documents in paper or electronic format.
- 6. This Assignment may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which will be deemed an original but all of which together will constitute one and the same instrument.

FIFTH AMENDMENT TO THE AGREEMENT FOR ARMORED CAR SERVICES BETWEEN THE CITY OF PEMBROKE PINES AND DUNBAR ARMORED CAR SERVICES, INC.

THIS AGREEMENT, dated this 12 day of Teleprasy 2018, by and between:

THE CITY OF PEMBROKE PINES, a municipal corporation organized and operating under the laws of the State of Florida, with an address of 601 City Center Way, Pembroke Pines, FL 33025, hereinafter referred to as "CITY",

and

DUNBAR ARMORED CAR SERVICES, INC., a Florida corporation authorized to do business in the State of Florida, with a business address of **50 Schilling Road, Hunt Valley, MD 21031,** hereinafter referred to as "CONTRACTOR". "CITY" and "CONTRACTOR" may be collectively referred to as the "PARTIES".

WHEREAS, pursuant to RFP # AD-09-10, on April 1, 2010, the CITY and CONTRACTOR entered into the Original Agreement for Armored Car Services for an initial two (2) year period, which expired on March 31, 2012; and,

WHEREAS, the Original Agreement authorized the option to renew the Agreement for additional two (2) year terms upon mutual consent of the parties; and,

WHEREAS, on February 28, 2011, the First Amendment to the Original Agreement was signed whereby the CITY's Charter Schools was added to the Original Agreement and the CONTRACTOR agreed to provide pricing for the CITY Charter Schools at a lower rate than what CITY is charged at other locations, but is the same rate at which the CONTRACTOR provided similar services to the School Board of Broward County, Florida Schools; and,

WHEREAS, on February 22, 2012, the Parties executed the Second Amendment to the Original Agreement which renewed the term of the Original Agreement for two years commencing on April 1, 2012 and terminating on March 31, 2014; and,

WHEREAS, on March 2, 2015, the Parties executed the Third Amendment to the Original Agreement for the second two (2) year renewal term commencing on April 1, 2014 and terminating on March 31, 2016; and,

WHEREAS, on May 31, 2016, the Parties Executed the Fourth Amendment to the Original Agreement for the third two (2) year renewal term commencing on April 1, 2016 and terminating on March 31, 2018; the Amendment also provided a pricing increase of 0.9% to the Contractors annual compensation, increasing the total from \$39,514.80 to \$39,870.43; and,



nationally recognized or published index; and,

WHEREAS, the Consumer Price Index for All Urban (CPI-U) had an increase of 2.7% in all expenditure category for All Items; and,

WHEREAS, to date the Parties have been satisfied with the performance and execution of the Agreement, and desire to renew the terms of their contractual relationship as set forth herein; and,

WHEREAS, the Parties specifically seek to execute the fourth two (2) year renewal option and desire to exercise the option to increase pricing by 2.7%.

WITNESSETH

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the sum of the mutual covenants and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The recitations set forth in the above "WHEREAS" clauses are true and correct and incorporated herein by this reference.

SECTION 2. The Original Agreement is hereby renewed for the fourth (2) year renewal period commencing on April 1, 2018 and terminating on March 31, 2020.

SECTION 3. The Parties agree that Article 5.2 of the Original Agreement, which was revised in the First Amendment and Fourth Amendment, is hereby amended as follows:

- 5.2 Based on a LUMP SUM FEE OF AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED THIRTY NINE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED SEVENTY DOLLARS AND FORTY THREE CENTS (\$39,870.43). FORTY THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED FORTY SIX DOLLARS AND NINETY THREE CENTS (\$40,946.93). Per year, payable monthly payments for actual services performed for armored car services. Future Price adjustments, up or down shall be based on a nationally recognized or published index, including fuel surcharge adjustment, relevant to providing these services.
- **SECTION 4.** In the event of any conflict or ambiguity by and between the terms and provisions of this Fifth Amendment, the Fourth Amendment, the Third Amendment, the Second Amendment, the First Amendment, and the Original Agreement, the terms and provisions of this amendment shall control to the extent of any such conflict or ambiguity.
- **SECTION 5.** The Parties agree that in all other respects the Original Agreement, as amended by the First Amendment, the Second Amendment, the Third Amendment, the Fourth Amendment, and this Fifth Amendment shall remain in full force and effect, except as specifically modified herein.

SECTION 6. Each Exhibit referred to in the Original Agreement, except as repealed herein, forms an essential part of this Agreement. The exhibits, if not physically attached, should be

treated as part of this Agreement and are incorporated herein by reference.

AGREEMENT

THIS IS AN AGREEMENT, dated the /8 day of May, 2010, between:

THE CITY OF PEMBROKE PINES, a municipal corporation of the State of Florida with a business address of 10100 Pines Boulevard, Pembroke Pines, Florida 33026, hereinafter referred to as "CITY,"

and

<u>Dunbar Armored Car Services Inc.</u>, an organization, authorized to do business in the State of Florida, with a business address of <u>50 Schilling Road</u>, <u>Hunt Valley</u>, <u>MD 21031</u>, hereinafter referred to as "CONTRACTOR."

WITNESSETH:

In consideration of the mutual terms and condition, promises, covenants, and payments hereinafter set forth, CITY and CONTRACTOR agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 PREAMBLE

In order to establish the background, context and form of reference for this Agreement and to generally express the objectives, and intentions, of the respective parties herein, the following statements, representations and explanations shall be accepted as predicates for the undertakings and commitments included within the provisions which follow and may be relied upon by the parties as essential elements of the mutual considerations upon which this Agreement is based.

1.1 On <u>November 25, 2009</u>, the CITY advertised its notice to bidders of the CITY's desire to hire a firm to provide Armored Car Services, as more particularly described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, for the said proposal entitled:

"RFP AD-09-10" "Armored Car Services"

- 1.2 On <u>December 15, 2009</u> the bids were opened at the offices of the City Clerk.
- 1.3 On <u>March 3, 2010</u>, the CITY awarded the bid to CONTRACTOR and authorized the proper CITY officials to negotiate and enter into an agreement with CONTRACTOR to render the professional services more particularly described herein below.
- 1.4.1 Negotiations pertaining to the services to be performed by the CONTRACTOR were undertaken and this Agreement incorporates the results of such negotiation.

ARTICLE 2 SERVICES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

2.1 CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to perform the services as more particularly described in Composite Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, in accordance with the Scope of Services outlined in the specifications, "RFP # AD-09-10, attached hereto and made it part hereof as Composite Exhibit "A" and CONTRACTOR'S response thereto, attached hereto and made a part hereof as Composite Exhibit "B".

CONTRACTOR agrees to do everything required by this Agreement, the Sealed Bid Package No. RFP AD-09-10, Addenda to this Agreement and Commission award complete with proposal form.

- 2.2 CONTRACTOR shall schedule regular meetings with the CITY representatives at least once a month to discuss the progress of the work and maintenance of the City's security services, as more specifically described in **Composite Exhibit "A"**.
- 2.3 CONTRACTOR shall furnish all services, labor, equipment, and materials necessary and as may be required in the performance of this Agreement, except as otherwise specifically provided for herein, and all work performed under this Agreement shall be done in a professional manner.
- 2.4 CONTRACTOR hereby represents to CITY, with full knowledge that CITY is relying upon these representations when entering into this Agreement with CONTRACTOR, that CONTRACTOR has the professional expertise, experience and manpower to perform the services to be provided by CONTRACTOR pursuant to the terms of this agreement.
- 2.5 CONTRACTOR hereby represents to CITY that CONTRACTPR is properly licensed by the applicable federal, state, and local agencies to provide the services under this Agreement. Furthermore, CONTRACTOR agrees to maintain such licenses during the term of this Agreement. If CONTRACTOR's license is revoked, suspended, or terminated for any reason by any governmental agency, CONTRACTOR shall notify the CITY immediately.
- 2.6 CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to conduct all work and services under this Agreement in accordance with all the applicable federal, state, and local laws or regulations. A violation of any federal, state, or local law or regulation may be cause for breach, allowing the CITY to terminate this Agreement.

ARTICLE 3 PROTECTION OF CITY'S PROPERTY

At all times during the performance of this Contract, the CONTRACTOR shall protect the

CITY's property from all damage whatsoever on account of CONTRACTOR's performance of services carried on under this Contract.

Article 4 TERM AND TERMINATION

- 4.1 CONTRACTOR shall perform the armored car services associated with the Properties identified in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof, for an initial two (2) year period commencing on April 1, 2010 and ending on April 1, 2012.
- 4.2 This Agreement may be renewed for additional **two (2)** year terms upon mutual consent, evidenced by a written Amendment to this Agreement extending the term hereof.
- 4.3 This Agreement may be terminated by either party for cause, upon thirty (30) days written notice by the CITY to CONTRACTOR, in which event the CONTRACTOR shall be paid its compensation for services performed to termination date. In the event that the CONTRACTOR abandons this Agreement or causes it to be terminated, he shall indemnify the CITY against any loss pertaining to this termination up to a maximum of the full contracted fee amount.

ARTICLE 5 CONTRACT SUM

- 5.1 The CITY hereby agrees to compensate CONTRACTOR for all services performed by CONTRACTOR pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.
- Based on a LUMP SUM FEE OF AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$23,160.80 (Twenty Three thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars and 80/100) per year, payable monthly payments for actual services performed for armored car services. Future price adjustments, up or down shall be based on a nationally recognized or published index, including fuel surcharge adjustment, relevant to providing these services.
- 5.3 The CITY shall within thirty (30) days, from the date the CITY's Department Directors approve the Application for Payment, pay the CONTRACTOR the amount approved by the CITY's Department Directors, or his/her assignees.

ARTICLE 6 CHANGES IN SCOPE OF WORK

6.1 CITY or CONTRACTOR may request changes that would increase, decrease, or otherwise modify the Scope of Services, as described in Composite Exhibit "A" to be provided under this Agreement as described in Article 2 of this Agreement. These changes will affect the monthly compensation accordingly. Such changes or additional services must be in accordance

with the provisions of the Code of Ordinances of the CITY, and must be contained in a written amendment, executed by the parties hereto, with the same formality and with equality and dignity prior to any deviation from the terms of this Agreement, including the initiation of any additional or extra work..

6.2 In no event will the CONTRACTOR be compensated for any work which has not been described in a separate written agreement executed by the parties hereto.

ARTICLE 7 INDEMIFICATION

The CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the CITY, its trustees, elected and appointed officers, agents, servants and employees, from and against any and all claims demands, or causes of action whatsoever, and the resulting losses, costs, expenses, reasonable attorney's fees, liabilities, damages, orders, judgments, or decrees, sustained by the CITY or any third party arising out of, or by reason of, or resulting from the CONTRACTOR's negligent acts, errors, or omissions.

ARTICLE 8 CONTRACTOR'S LIABILITY INSURANCE

- 8.1 The CONTRACTOR shall not commence performance hereunder until it has obtained all insurance required under this paragraph and such insurance has been approved by the Risk Manager of the CITY nor shall the CONTRACTOR allow any subcontractor to commence work on his subcontract until all similar such insurance required of the subcontractor has been obtained and approved.
- 8.2 Certificates of insurance, reflecting evidence of the required insurance, shall be filed with the City's Risk Manager prior to the commencement of this agreement. These Certificates shall contain a provision that coverages afforded under these policies will not be canceled until at least forty five days (45) prior written notice has been given to the CITY. Policies shall be issued by companies authorized to do business under the laws of the State of Florida. Financial Ratings must be not less than "A-VI" in the latest edition of "Best Key Rating Guide", published by A.M. Best Guide.
- Insurance shall be in force until the obligations required to be fulfilled under the terms of the Agreement is satisfied. In the event the insurance certificate provided indicates that the insurance shall terminate and lapse during the period of this Agreement, then in that event, the C"ONTRACTOR shall furnish, at least forty-five (45) days prior to the expiration of the date of such insurance, a renewed certificate of insurance as proof that equal and like coverage for the balance of the period of the Agreement and extension there under is in effect. The CONTRACTOR shall not commence nor continue to provide any services pursuant to this

Agreement unless all required insurance remains in full force and effect. CONTRACTOR shall be liable to CITY for any lapses in service resulting from a gap in insurance coverage.

8.4 REQUIRED INSURNACE

8.4.1 Comprehensive General Liability insurance to cover liability bodily injury and property damage. Exposures to be covered are: premises, operations, products/completed operations, and certain contracts. Coverage must be written on an occurrence basis, with the following limits of liability:

A.	Bodily Injury 1. Each Occurrence 2. Annual Aggregate	\$1,000,000 1,000,000

C.	Personal Injury Annual Aggregate	1,000,000

- D. Completed Operations and Products Liability shall be maintained for two (2) years after the final payment.
- E. Property Damage Liability Insurance shall include Coverage for the following hazards: X explosion, C Collapse, U underground.
- 8.4.2 Errors & Omissions Coverage for Directors and Officers \$1,000,000 limit
- 8.4.3 Workers Compensation insurance shall be maintained during the life of this contract to comply with statutory limits for all employees, and in the case any work is sublet, the CONTRACTOR shall require the Subcontractors similarly to provide Workers Compensation Insurance for all the latter's employees unless such employees are covered by the protection afforded by the CONTRACTOR. The following limits must be maintained:
 - A. Workers Compensation Statutory
 - B. Employer's Liability \$ 100,000 each accident

\$ 500,000 Disease-policy limit

\$ 100,000 Disease-each employee

If CONTRACTOR claims to be exempt from this requirement, CONTRACTOR shall provide CITY proof of such exemption along with a written request for CITY to exempt CONTRACTOR, written on CONTRACTOR letterhead.

8.4.4 Comprehensive Auto Liability – coverage shall include owned, hired and non-owned vehicles.

A. Bodily Injury

- 8.5 The CONTRACTOR shall name the CITY as an additional insured on each of the policies required herein and shall hold the CITY harmless on account of claims for damages to persons, property or premises arising out of the services provided hereunder.
- 8.6 Any insurance required of CONTRACTOR pursuant to this Agreement must also be required by any sub-contractor in the same limits and with all requirements as provided herein, including naming the CITY as an additional insured, in any work is subcontracted unless such subcontractor is covered by the protection afforded by the CONTRACTOR and provided proof of such coverage is provided to CITY. The CONTRACTOR and any subcontractors shall maintain such policies during the term of this Agreement

ARTICLE 9 PROTECTION OF CITY'S PROPERTY

9.1 At all times during the performance of this Contract, the CONTRACTOR shall protect the CITY's property from all damage whatsoever on account of the work being carried on under this contract.

ARTICLE 10 CONTRACTOR'S INDEMNIFICATION

- 10.1 The CONTRACTOR agrees to release the CITY from and against any and all liability and responsibility in connection with the above mentioned matters. The CONTRACTOR further agrees not to sue or seek any money or damages from CITY in connection with the above mentioned matters.
- 10.2 The CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the CITY, its trustees, elected and appointed officers, agents, servants and employees, from and against any and all claims, demands, or causes of action of whatsoever kind or nature, and the resulting losses, costs, expenses, reasonable attorneys' fees, liabilities, damages, orders, judgments, or decrees, sustained by the CITY or any third party arising out of, or by reason of, or resulting

from the CONTRACTOR's negligent acts, errors, or omissions.

10.3 The parties recognize that various provisions of this Agreement, including but not necessarily limited to this Section, provide for indemnification by the CONTRACTOR and that §725.06, Florida Statutes, requires a specific consideration be given therefor. The parties therefore agree that the sum of Ten Dollars and 00/100 (\$10.00), receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, is the specific consideration for such indemnities, and the providing of such indemnities is deemed to be part of the specifications with respect to the services to be provided by CONTRACTOR. Furthermore, the parties understand and agree that the covenants and representations relating to this indemnification provision shall serve the term of this Agreement and continue in full force and effect as to the party's responsibility to indemnify.

ARTICLE 11 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

11.1 This Agreement does not create an employee/employer relationship between the parties. It is the intent of the parties that the CONTRACTOR is an independent contractor under this Agreement and not the CITY's employee for all purposes, including but not limited to, the application of the Fair Labor Standards Act minimum wage and overtime payments, Federal Insurance Contribution Act, the Social Security Act, the Federal Unemployment Tax Act, the provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, the State Workers Compensation Act, and the State unemployment insurance law. The CONTRACTOR shall retain sole and absolute discretion in the judgment of the manner and means of carrying out the CONTRACTOR's activities and responsibilities hereunder provided, further that administrative procedures applicable to services rendered under this Agreement shall be those of the CONTRACTOR, which policies of the CONTRACTOR shall not conflict with CITY, H.U.D., or United States policies, rules or regulations relating to the use of the CONTRACTOR's Funds provided for herein. CONTRACTOR agree that it is a separate and independent enterprise from the CITY, that it has full opportunity to find other business, that it has made its own investment in its business, and that it will utilize a high level of skill necessary to perform the work. This Agreement shall not be construed as creating any joint employment relationship between the CONTRACTOR and the CITY and the CITY will not be liable for any obligation incurred by CONTRACTOR, including but not limited to unpaid minimum wages and/or overtime premiums.

ARTICLE 12 PERFORMANCE BOND

12.1.1 At the time of the execution of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall have ineffect a Performance Bond guaranteeing to the CITY the completion and performance of the
Scope of Services and work covered in the Agreement. The Performance Bond shall at all times
be valid and in force to cover the Work being performed. The Performance Bond shall be
executed by a Surety Company approved by the U.S. Treasury Department, licensed to do
business in the State of Florida, and having a registered agent in Broward County.

The CONTRACTOR agrees to keep such Bonds, or a replacement thereof, in force at all times during the course of performance of this Agreement. In addition to the foregoing requirements, such Bond shall contain provisions, whether by attaching endorsements or supplemental agreements, guaranteeing to the CITY the completion of services of the performance of this Agreement. CONTRACTOR may comply with the requirements of this provision by causing said Bond to specifically name the CITY OF PEMBROKE PINES as one of the parties to whom the protection afforded by said Bond is extended or as an alternative, may furnish the CITY with a separate Performance Bond meeting the same criteria provided above.

ARTICLE 13 DEFAULT OF CONTRACT & REMEDIES

13.1 Liquidated Damages.

As a breach of the service provided by this Agreement would cause serious and substantial damage to the CITY Property, and the nature of this Agreement would render it impracticable or extremely difficult to fix the actual damage sustained by the CITY by such breach, it is agreed that, in case of breach of service wherein CONTRACTOR fails to maintain the Property, leaving the said property in disrepair, the CITY may elect to collect liquidated damages for each such breach, and the Contractor will pay the CITY as liquidated damages, and not as penalty, five (\$500.00) hundred dollars for every day of such malfunction. This sum is the agreed upon amount by which the CITY will be damaged by the breach of such service. An election to seek such remedies shall not be construed as a waiver of any legal remedies the CITY may have as to any subsequent breach of service under its Agreement.

- 13.2 <u>Default of Contract</u>. The occurrence of any one or more of the following events shall constitute a default and breach of this Agreement by CONTRACTOR:
- 13.2.1. The abandonment of the Property by CONTRACTOR for a period of more than seven (7) business days.
- 13.2.2 The abandonment, unnecessary delay, refusal of, or failure to comply with any of the terms of this Agreement or neglect, or refusal to comply with the instructions of the Public Services Director relative thereto.
- 13.2.3. The failure by CONTRACTOR to observe or perform any of the terms, covenants, or conditions of this Agreement to be observed or performed by CONTRACTOR, where such failure shall continue for a period of seven (7) days after written notice thereof by CITY to CONTRACTOR; provided, however, that if the nature of CONTRACTOR's default is such that more than seven (7) days are reasonably required for its cure, then CONTRACTOR shall not be deemed to be in default if CONTRACTOR commences such cure within said seven (7) day period and thereafter diligently prosecutes such cure to completion.

- 13.2.4. The assignment and/or transfer of this Agreement or execution or attachment thereon by CONTRACTOR or any other party in a manner not expressly permitted hereunder.
- 13.2.5. The making by CONTRACTOR of any general assignment or general arrangement for the benefit of creditors, or the filing by or against CONTRACTOR of a petition to have CONTRACTOR adjudged a bankruptcy, or a petition for reorganization or arrangement under any law relating to bankruptcy (unless, in the case of a petition filed against CONTRACTOR, the same is dismissed within sixty (60) days); or the appointment of a trustee or a receiver to take possession of substantially all of CONTRACTOR's assets, or for CONTRACTOR's interest in this Agreement, where possession is not restored to CONTRACTOR within thirty (30) days; for attachment, execution or other judicial seizure of substantially all of CONTRACTOR's assets, or for CONTRACTOR's interest in this Agreement, where such seizure is not discharged within thirty (30) days.
- 13.3 <u>Remedies in Default</u>. In case of default by CONTRACTOR, the CITY shall notify the CONTRACTOR, in writing, of such abandonment, delay, refusal, failure, neglect, or default and direct him to comply with all provisions of the Agreement. A copy of such written notice shall be mailed to the Surety on the Performance Bond ("Surety"). If the abandonment, delay, refusal, failure, or neglect is not cured within seven (7) days of when notice was sent by CITY, CITY may declare a default of the Agreement and notify the CONTRACTOR and the Surety of such declaration of default and terminate the Agreement.

The Surety on the Performance Bond shall within ten (10) days of such declaration of default rectify or cause to be rectified any mismanagement or breach of service in the Agreement and assume the work of CONTRACTOR and proceed to perform services under the Agreement, at its own cost and expense.

- 13.3.1. Upon such declaration of default, all payments remaining due the CONTRACTOR at the time of default, less all sums due the CITY for damages suffered, or expenses incurred by reason of default, shall be due and payable to the Surety. Thereafter the Surety shall receive monthly payments equal to those that would have been paid the CONTRACTOR had the CONTRACTOR continued to perform the services under the Agreement.
- 13.3.2. If such Surety fails to perform, the CITY may complete the Contract, or any part thereof, either by day labor or re-letting a Contract for the same, and procure the equipment and the facilities necessary for the completion of the Contract, and charge the cost of same to the CONTRACTOR and/or the Surety together with the costs incident thereto to such default.
- 13.3.3. In the event the CITY completes the Contract at a lesser cost than would have been payable to the CONTRACTOR under this agreement, if the same had been fulfilled by

said CONTRACTOR, CITY shall retain such differences. Should such cost to the CITY be greater, the CONTRACTOR and/or the Surety shall pay the amount of such excess to the CITY.

ARTICLE 14 BANKRUPTCY

It is agreed that if the CONTRACTOR is adjudged bankrupt, either voluntarily or involuntarily, then this Agreement shall terminate effective on the date and at the time the bankruptcy petition is filed.

ARTICLE 15 DISPUTE RESOLUTION

15.1 <u>Arbitration</u>. In addition to any other remedy provided hereunder, the CITY, at its option, may use arbitration to resolve any controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this Contract if arbitration is elected by the CITY. Any controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this Contract, or breach thereof, may be settled by arbitration in accordance with the rules of the American Arbitration Association and judgment upon the award rendered by the arbitrators may be entered into by any court having jurisdiction thereof. In the event arbitration is elected by the CITY, such controversy or claim shall be submitted to one arbitrator selected from the National Panel of The American Arbitration Association.

15.2 Operations During Dispute.

- 15.2.1 In the event that a dispute, if any, arises between the CITY and the CONTRACTOR relating to this agreement performance or compensation hereunder, the CONTRACTOR shall continue to render service in full compliance with all terms and conditions of this agreement as interpreted by the CITY regardless of such dispute.
- 15.2.2 The CONTRACTOR expressly recognizes the paramount right and duty of the CITY to provide adequate maintenance of the City's Property, and further agrees, in consideration for the execution of this Agreement, that in the event of such a dispute, if any, it will not seek injunctive relief in any court, but will negotiate with the CITY for an adjustment on the matter or matters in dispute and, upon failure of said negotiations to resolve the dispute, may present the matter to a court of competent jurisdiction in an appropriate suit therefore instituted by it or by the CITY.
- 15.2.3 Notwithstanding the other provisions in this Section, the City reserves the right to terminate the Agreement at any time, whenever the service provided by the CONTRACTOR fails to meet reasonable standards of the trade after the CITY gives written notice to the CONTRACTOR of the deficiencies as set forth in the written notice within fourteen (14) days of the receipt by the CONTRACTOR of such notice from the CITY.

ARTICLE 16 MISCELLANEOUS

- 16.1 Ownership of Documents. Reports, surveys, studies, and other data provided in connection with this Agreement are and shall remain the property of CITY, whether or not the project for which they are made is completed.
- 16.2 <u>Legal Representation</u>. It is acknowledged that each party to this agreement had the opportunity to be represented by counsel in the preparation of this Agreement, and accordingly, the rule that a contract shall be interpreted strictly against the party preparing same shall not apply herein due to the joint contributions of both parties.
- 16.3 <u>Records</u>. CONTRACTOR shall keep such records and accounts and require any and all subcontractors to keep records and accounts as may be necessary in order to record complete and correct entries as to personnel hours charged to this engagement, and any expenses for which CONTRACTOR expects to be reimbursed. Such books and records will be available at all reasonable times for examination and audit by CITY and shall be kept for a period of three (3) years after the completion of all work to be performed pursuant to this Agreement. Incomplete or incorrect entries in such books and records will be grounds for disallowance by CITY of any fees or expenses based upon such entries.
- 16.4 <u>Assignments</u>; <u>Amendments</u>. This Agreement, and any interests herein, shall not be assigned, transferred or otherwise encumbered, under any circumstances, by CONTRACTOR without the prior written consent of CITY. For purposes of this Agreement, any change of ownership of CONTRACTOR shall constitute an assignment which requires CITY approval. However, this Agreement shall run to the CITY and its successors and assigns.

It is further agreed that no modification, amendment, or alteration in the terms or conditions contained herein shall be effective unless contained in a written document executed with the same formality and of equal dignity herewith.

16.5 No Contingent Fees. CONTRACTOR warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the CONTRACTOR to solicit or secure this Agreement, and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any person, company, corporation, individual or firm, other than a bona fide employee working solely for CONTRACTOR any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Agreement. For the breach or violation of this provision, the CITY shall have the right to terminate the Agreement without liability at its discretion, to deduct from the contract price, or otherwise recover the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage, gift or consideration.

16.6 <u>Notice</u>. Whenever any party desires to give notice unto any other party, it must be given by written notice, sent by certified United States mail, with return receipt requested, addressed to the party for whom it is intended and the remaining party, at the places last specified, and the places for giving of notice shall remain such until they shall have been changed by written notice in compliance with the provisions of this section. For the present, the CONTRACTOR and the CITY designate the following as the respective places for giving of notice:

- 16.10 <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement or application thereof to any person or situation shall to any extent, be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, and the application of such provisions to persons or situations other than those as to which it shall

have been held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, and shall continue in full force and effect, and be enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.

- 16.12 Extent of Agreement. This Agreement represents the entire and integrated agreement between the CITY and the CONTRACTOR and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or agreements, either written or oral.
- 16.13 <u>Waiver</u>. Failure of the CITY to insist upon strict performance of any provision or condition of this Agreement, or to execute any right therein contained, shall not be constructed as a waiver or relinquishment for the future of any such provision, condition, or right, but the same shall remain in full force and effect.
- 16.14 <u>Disputes</u>. Any claim, objection, or dispute arising out of the terms of this Agreement shall be litigated in the Seventeenth Judicial Circuit Court in and for Broward County.
- 16.15 Attorney's Fees. In the event that either party brings suit for enforcement of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to attorney's fees and court costs in addition to any other remedy afforded by law.
- 16.16 <u>Protection of City Property</u>. At all times during the performance of this Contract, the CONTRACTOR shall protect the CITY's property from all damage whatsoever on account of the work being carried on under this contract.

Service is to be provided to all City of Pembroke Pines Charter School locations and other locations as may be requested. Failure to indicate a company representative may result in disqualification of proposal submitted.

PROTECTION OF DEPOSITS

22. DAVIS-BACON & RELATED ACTS:

## **SUMMARY EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND:**

- 1. Pursuant to Section 35.29(F) "City Commission notification" of the City's Code of Ordinances, "The City Manager, or his or her designee, shall notify the Commission, in writing, at least three months in advance of the expiration, renewal, automatic renewal or extension date, and shall provide a copy of the contract or agreement and a vendor performance report card for the contract or agreement to the City Commission."
- 2. On May 17, 2017, Commission approved the motion to place all contracts from the Contract Database Reports on consent agendas as they come up for contractual term renewal so that City Commission affirms directions to administration whether to renew or to go out to bid.
- 3. The Legislative Consultant items shown below are on the December 2017 Contract Database Report.

## (A) Dunbar Armored Car Services, Inc. - Armored Car Services

- 1. On March 3, 2010, the City Commission approved to enter into an agreement with Dunbar Armored Car Services, Inc. for an initial two (2) year period commencing on April 1, 2010 and ending on April 1, 2012.
- 2. The City utilizes Dunbar Armored Car Services, Inc. to provide all the departments citywide with the same armored car services for the pickup of accounts at City divisions to be delivered to a specified depository.
- 3. Pursuant to Section 4.2 of the Original Agreement, the term may be extended for additional two (2) year renewal terms upon mutual consent, evidenced by a written Amendment to this Agreement extending the term thereof.
- 4. On February 28, 2011, the City and Dunbar Armored Car Services, Inc. agreed to amend the Original Agreement to add the City's Charter Schools at a lower rate. This lower rate is the same rate that Dunbar Armored Car Services, Inc. provides to the School Board of Broward County, Florida Schools.
- 5. To date, the agreement has had four Amendments, including three (3) two (2) year renewals which extended the term of the agreement to March 31, 2018.
- 6. Based on the 90 day requirement, this Agreement would need to be presented to Commission by December 31, 2017.
- 7. The Charter Schools, City Clerk and Community Services Department recommends that the City renew this Agreement for an additional two (2) year term, commencing on April 1, 2018 and expiring on March 31, 2020, as followed by the agreement.

## (B) SRT Supply, Inc. - The purchase of Body Armor for the Police Department

1. On February 3, 2016, the City Commission approved to enter into an agreement with SRT Supply, Inc. for an initial one (1) year period commencing on March 1, 2016 and ending on

February 28, 2017.

- 2. The City of Pembroke Pines Police Department utilizes SRT Supply, Inc. for the purchase of Body Armor for the Police Department used on an as needed basis.
- 3. Pursuant to Section 2.2 of the Original Agreement, the term may be renewed for five (5) additional one (1) year terms upon mutual written consent, evidenced by a written Amendment to this Agreement extending the term thereof.
- 4. The Police Department recommends that the City renew this Agreement for an additional one (1) year term commencing on March 1, 2018 and ending on February 28, 2019, as followed by the agreement.

## (C) Anderson Aquatics, LLC. - Competitive & Instructional Programming Services

- 1. On September 3, 2008, the City Commission approved to enter into an agreement with Anderson Aquatics, LLC. for an initial three (3) year period commencing on October 1, 2008 and ending on September 30, 2011.
- 2. The City of Pembroke Pines Recreation & Cultural Arts Department utilizes Anderson Aquatics, LLC. to develop and implement a USA Swimming Program or any other nationally recognized aquatic program approved by the parks and recreation director.
- 3. Pursuant to Section 1.01 of the Original Agreement, the term may renew for two (2) additional three-year terms upon the same terms, conditions and limitations imposed in the Original Agreement.
- 4. To date, the agreement has had three Amendments, including two (2) three (3) year renewals and one (1) six-month extension which extended the term of the agreement to March 31, 2018.
- 5. This agreement is currently in the final renewal period, therefore the Recreation & Cultural Arts Department will start the procurement process for these services.

## CONSUMER PRICE MOVEMENTS FEBRUARY 2017

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) increased 0.1 percent in February on a seasonally adjusted basis, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today. Over the last 12 months, the all items index rose 2.7 percent before seasonal adjustment.

The February increase was the smallest 1-month rise in the seasonally adjusted all items index since July 2016. The gasoline index declined, partially offsetting increases in several indexes, including food, shelter, and recreation. The energy index fell 1.0 percent, with the decline in gasoline outweighing increases in the other energy component indexes. The food index increased 0.2 percent over the month, its largest rise since September 2015.

The index for all items less food and energy rose 0.2 percent in February. The indexes for shelter, recreation, apparel, airline fares, motor vehicle insurance, education, and medical care were among those that increased in February. Indexes that declined include communication, used cars and trucks, new vehicles, and household furnishings and operations.

The all items index rose 2.7 percent for the 12 months ending February; the 12-month increase has been trending upward since a July 2016 trough of 0.8 percent. The index for all items less food and energy rose 2.2 percent over the last 12 months; this was the fifteenth straight month the 12-month change remained in the range of 2.1 to 2.3 percent. The energy index rose 15.2 percent over the last year, while the food index was unchanged.

#### Food

The food index rose 0.2 percent in February following a 0.1-percent increase in January. The food at home index rose 0.3 percent, its largest advance since June 2015. Four of the six major grocery store food group indexes rose in February. The index for nonalcoholic beverages increased 1.5 percent, its largest increase since January 2011. The index for dairy and related products rose 0.8 percent, the same increase as last month. The fruits and vegetables index increased 0.7 percent after declining in each of the last 6 months. The index for meats, poultry, fish, and eggs rose 0.2 percent in February.

The indexes for cereals and bakery products and for other food at home both declined 0.4 percent in February. The index for food away from home rose 0.2 percent in February after a 0.4 percent increase in January. Over the last 12 months the index for food at home fell 1.7 percent, while the food away from home index increased 2.4 percent, leaving the overall food index unchanged.

## **Energy**

The energy index fell 1.0 percent in February, its first decline since July 2016. The gasoline index fell 3.0 percent after a 7.8-percent increase in January. (Before seasonal adjustment, gasoline prices decreased 2.1 percent in February.) Other major energy component indexes increased in February. The index for natural gas rose 1.5 percent, the same increase as last month. The electricity index increased 0.8 percent after being unchanged the prior 3 months.

The index for energy increased 15.2 percent over the past year, with all of its major components rising. The gasoline index rose 30.7 percent, its largest 12-month increase since September 2011. The index for natural gas rose 10.9 percent, and the electricity index advanced 1.9 percent.

## All items less food and energy

The index for all items less food and energy increased 0.2 percent in February. The shelter index rose 0.3 percent in February, with the indexes for rent and owner's equivalent rent both advancing 0.3 percent. The recreation index rose 0.6 percent in February, its largest increase since April 2001. The apparel index also rose 0.6 percent in February. The index for motor vehicle insurance continued to rise, increasing 0.5 percent. The index for airline fares also continued to increase, rising 2.4 percent following a 2.0-percent increase in January.

The index for medical care rose 0.1 percent in February. The index for hospital services rose 0.4 percent, while the index for prescription drugs declined 0.2 percent. The education index increased 0.3 percent in February, and the index for tobacco advanced 0.4 percent.

In contrast to these increases, the communication index fell in February, declining 0.6 percent. The index for used cars and trucks also fell 0.6 percent, and the index for new vehicles, which rose 0.9 percent in January, declined 0.2 percent in February. The index for household furnishings and operations declined 0.1 percent, as did the index for alcoholic beverages. The index for personal care was unchanged in February.

The index for all items less food and energy rose 2.2 percent over the past 12 months. The indexes for shelter and for medical care both increased 3.5 percent over the past year. The index for new vehicles increased 0.5 percent, and the apparel index rose 0.4 percent. The indexes for used cars and trucks and for airline fares both declined over the past 12 months.

## Not seasonally adjusted CPI measures

The Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) increased 2.7 percent over the last 12 months to an index level of 243.603 (1982-84=100). For the month, the index rose 0.3 percent prior to seasonal adjustment.

The Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) increased 2.8 percent over the last 12 months to an index level of 237.477 (1982-84=100). For the month, the index increased 0.3 percent prior to seasonal adjustment.

The Chained Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (C-CPI-U) increased 2.9 percent over the last 12 months. For the month, the index rose 0.3 percent on a not seasonally adjusted basis. Please note that the indexes for the past 10 to 12 months are subject to revision.

The Consumer Price Index for March 2017 is scheduled to be released on Friday, April 14, 2017, at 8:30 a.m. (EDT)

## **Consumer Price Index Geographic Revision for 2018**

In January 2018, BLS will introduce a new geographic area sample for the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The 2018 revision utilizes the 2010 Decennial Census and incorporates an updated area sample design, changes the frequency of publication for several local area indexes, and establishes some new local area and aggregate indexes. 

#### **Technical Notes**

## **Brief Explanation of the CPI**

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change in prices over time of goods and services purchased by households. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) publishes CPIs for two population groups: (1) The CPI for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W), which covers households of wage earners and clerical workers that comprise approximately 28 percent of the total population and (2) the CPI for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) and the Chained CPI for All Urban Consumers (C-CPI-U), which covers approximately 89 percent of the total population and include, in addition to wage earner and clerical worker households, groups such as professional, managerial, and technical workers, the self-employed, short-term workers, the unemployed, and retirees and others not in the labor force.

The CPIs are based on prices of food, clothing, shelter, and fuels, transportation fares, charges for doctors' and dentists' services, drugs, and other goods and services that people buy for day-to-day living. Prices are collected each month in 87 urban areas across the country from about 6,000 housing units and approximately 23,000 retail establishments—department stores, supermarkets, hospitals, filling stations, and other types of stores and service establishments. All taxes directly associated with the purchase and use of items are included in the index. Prices of fuels and a few other items are obtained every month in all 87 locations. Prices of most other commodities and services are collected every month in the three largest geographic areas and every other month in other areas. Prices of most goods and services are obtained through personal visits or telephone calls by BLS trained representatives.

In calculating the index, price changes for the various items in each location are averaged together with weights that represent their importance in the spending of the appropriate population group. Local data are then combined to obtain a U.S. city average. For the CPI-U and CPI-W, separate indexes also are published by size of city, by region of the country, for cross-classifications of regions and population-size classes, and for 27 local areas. Area indexes do not measure differences in the level of prices among cities; they measure only the average change in prices for each area since the base period. For the C-CPI-U, data are issued only at the national level. It is important to note that the CPI-U and CPI-W are considered final when released, but the C-CPI-U is issued in preliminary form and is subject to three quarterly revisions before the final version.

The index measures price change from a designated reference date. For the CPI-U and the CPI-W, the reference base is 1982–84 = 100.0. The reference base for the C-CPI-U is December 1999=100.0. An increase of 16.5 percent from the reference base, for example, is shown as 116.5. This change also can be expressed in dollars as follows: the price of a base-period market basket of goods and services in the CPI has risen from \$10 in 1982–84 to \$11.65.

#### Calculating index changes

Movements of the indexes from one month to another usually are expressed as percent changes, rather than changes in index points, because index point changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period, whereas percent changes are not. The example shown in the box on this page illustrates the computation of index point and percent changes.

#### Regions defined

The states in the four regions are listed below.

The Northeast--Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

The Midwest--Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin.

The South--Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, and the District of Columbia.

The West--Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming.

## **Energy prices**

Prices usually are available for the U.S. city average, 13 large metropolitan areas, the 4 census regions, 3 size classifications, and 10 areas reflecting the 4 census regions cross-classified by the 3 population sizes. However, not all energy commodities and services are used in every area of the country. Fuel oil, for example, is not a common heating fuel in some urban areas, particularly in the South and West. Where no average prices are available, the designation NA appears. This designation also appears if the data sufficiency criteria have not been met in any given month. For example, if there are fewer than five usable fuel oil prices for a published city or region size class, no fuel oil prices for the area will be published.

All prices are collected monthly by BLS representatives in the urban areas priced for the CPI. Prices for natural gas and electricity include fuel and purchased gas adjustments and all applicable taxes. Fuel oil and gasoline prices include applicable Federal, State, and local taxes.

Natural gas and electricity. Natural gas prices are reported in therms, which are a measure of heating value. Electricity prices are given in kilowatt hours (kwh). It should be noted that bills priced for the CPI not only are for different consumption amounts, but may also be calculated from different types of residential rate schedules. The average prices per therm and per kilowatt hour are not, therefore, generally suitable for use in place-to-place price comparisons.

Fuel oil. Only #2 fuel oil (home heating oil) is priced. Prices are collected, in most cases, for quantities greater than 1 gallon. These prices are converted to a gallon price for this program. Fuel oil prices reflect discounts for quantity or quick payment.

Gasoline and automotive diesel fuel. Gasoline and diesel prices, shown in table P3, are collected at the pump from a sample of full service, miniservice, and self-service gas stations. Approximate British Thermal Unit (BTU) values for some energy items are as follows, according to the source indicated:

### Food and beverage prices

Actual weighted average prices for food and beverages are calculated each month at the national level and for the four census geographic regions, as shown in table P4. As a result of changes in price collection methodology and sample sizes, average prices for individual cities cannot, in general, be produced. It is hoped, however, that regional average prices will help to satisfy the need for local area data. It should be noted that the average prices for food in this report reflect variations in brand, quality, and size among geographic areas. Users of average food prices should be aware that these differences exist.

Because a number of food commodities are not available in all areas on a year-round basis, prices will not appear in some months for some regions or for the U.S. city average. In other instances, sufficient prices may not be available due to temporary disruptions in supplies. Where no average prices are available, the designation NA appears. When a price is not available from an individual store in any month, an estimated price will be calculated for the missing item and used in computing the average price. For cases in which the proportion of estimated prices used to calculate the average is considered too high, the average price is not published, and NA appears for that item in the table.

Because of space limitations in the table, the description for each item is abbreviated. Detailed specifications are available from BLS information offices or from the Washington office, upon request.

## A Note on the Use of Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

#### Introduction

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) produces both unadjusted and seasonally adjusted data. Seasonally adjusted data are computed using seasonal factors derived by the X-13ARIMA-SEATS Seasonal Adjustment Method. These factors are updated each February, and the new factors are used to revise the previous five years of seasonally adjusted data. For more information on data revisions and exceptions to the usual revision schedule, please see the Fact Sheet on Seasonal Adjustment (https://www.bls.gov/cpi/cpisaqanda.htm) and the Timeline of Seasonal Adjustment Methodological Changes (https://www.bls.gov/cpi/cpiseastimeline.htm).

#### How to Use Seasonally Adjusted and Unadjusted Data

For analyzing short-term price trends in the economy, seasonally adjusted changes are usually preferred since they eliminate the effect of changes that normally occur at the same time and in about the same magnitude every year—such as price movements resulting from changing climatic conditions, production cycles, model changeovers, holidays, and sales. This allows data users to focus on changes that are not typical for the time of year.

The unadjusted data are of primary interest to consumers concerned about the prices they actually pay. Unadjusted data are also used extensively for escalation purposes. Many collective bargaining contract agreements and pension plans, for example, tie compensation changes to the Consumer Price Index before adjustment for seasonal variation. BLS advises against the use of seasonally adjusted data in escalation agreements because seasonally adjusted series are revised annually.

#### **Intervention Analysis**

The Bureau of Labor Statistics uses Intervention Analysis Seasonal Adjustment for some CPI series. Sometimes extreme values or sharp movements can distort the underlying seasonal pattern of price change. Intervention Analysis Seasonal Adjustment is a process by which the distortions caused by such unusual events are estimated and removed from the data prior to calculation of seasonal factors. The resulting seasonal factors, which more accurately represent the seasonal pattern, are then applied to the unadjusted data.

## 2017 Series Adjusted Using Intervention Analysis Seasonal Adjustment

For the seasonal factors introduced in January 2017, BLS adjusted 40 series using Intervention Analysis Seasonal Adjustment, including selected food and beverage items, motor fuels and natural gas. For example, this procedure was used for the *Motor fuel* series to offset the effects of events such as the 2009 return to normal pricing after the worldwide economic downturn in 2008.

#### **Revision of Seasonally Adjusted Indexes**

Seasonally adjusted data, including the *U.S. city average All items* index levels, are subject to revision for up to five years after their original release. Every year, economists in the CPI calculate new seasonal factors for seasonally adjusted series and apply them to the last five years of data. Seasonally adjusted indexes beyond the last five years of data are considered to be final and not subject to revision. In January 2017, revised seasonal factors and seasonally adjusted indexes for 2012-2016 were calculated and published. For directly adjusted series, the seasonal factors for 2016 will be applied to data in 2017 to produce the seasonally adjusted 2017 indexes.

#### **Determining Seasonal Status**

Each year the seasonal status of every series is reevaluated based upon certain statistical criteria. Using these criteria, BLS economists determine whether a series should change its status: from "not seasonally adjusted" to "seasonally adjusted", or vice versa. If any of the 81 components of the *U.S. city average all items* index change their seasonal adjustment status from seasonally adjusted to not seasonally adjusted, not seasonally adjusted data will be used in the aggregation of the dependent series for the last five years, but the seasonally adjusted indexes before that period will not be changed. 27 of the 81 components of the *U.S. city average all items* index are not seasonally adjusted for 2017.

#### **How to Obtain Consumer Price Index Information**

CPI information is available from BLS electronically, through publication subscriptions, and via telephone and fax through automated recordings. Information specialists also are available in the national and information offices to provide help and to respond to questions.

#### Electronic access to CPI data

BLS on the Internet. Through the Internet, BLS provides free, continuous access to published CPI data and press releases. The most recent month's CPI is made available immediately at the time of release. Additionally, a database called LABSTAT, containing current and historical data for the CPI, is accessible.

World Wide Web. BLS maintains a Web site at https://www.bls.gov on the InterneThis BLS homepage provides access to LABSTAT, as well as links to program-specific homepages. The CPI homepage https://www.bls.gov/cpi/provides other CPInformation, as well as indexes. This includes a brief explanation of methodology, frequently asked questions and answers, contacts for further information, and explanations of how the CPI program handles special items, such as medical care and housing. In addition, CPI press releases and historical data for metropolitan areas can be accessed by linking to the regional office home pages from the main BLS Web site listed above.

#### Recorded CPI data

Summary CPI data are provided on 24-hour recorded messages. Detailed CPI information may be obtained by calling (202) 691-5200. A touch-tone telephone is recommended, as this system allows the user to select specific indexes from lists of available data.

Recorded summaries of CPI data also may be obtained by calling any one of the metropolitan area CPI hotlines listed next. These hotline summaries typically include data for the U.S. city average, as well as for the specified area. The recordings are approximately 3 minutes in length, do not require a touch-tone telephone, and are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
