RE: City of Pembroke Pines ("City") / Second Amendment for the

Transportation Surtax Interlocal Agreement

On June 5, 2018, the County Commission voted to place on the November 6, 2018 ballot, for consideration by the countywide electorate, a proposed transportation surtax levy of one percent (1%). The County Commission also enacted the Broward County Transportation Surtax Ordinance which provides a process for municipalities to apply for project funding from surtax proceeds. In order to be eligible to apply during the 2018-19 fiscal year, municipalities were required to enter into a Transportation Surtax Interlocal Agreement ("Interlocal Agreement") prior to September 30, 2018. The Interlocal Agreement provided for ten percent (10% of surtax revenues to be used for eligible municipal transportation-related projects.

The City Commission approved the Interlocal Agreement at its September 17, 2018, meeting. The surtax was approved by the voters of Broward County at the November 6, 2018, election.

In June of 2019, the County issued the first amendment to ILA which clarified the role of the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) in the ranking process. An amendment to the Interlocal Agreement becomes effective upon approval by Broward County, the MPO, and by a majority of the municipalities in Broward County (the required number is 15 municipalities), as well as approvals by municipalities that include 50% of the County's population. The First Amendment was approved by Broward County and the MPO, and obtained the required municipal approvals.

In June, 2020, after ranking by the MPO, ninety-seven (97) municipal capital projects were funded in Fiscal Year 2020 for a total of \$66 million. This included

funding for design for Pembroke Rd extension from SW 196th Ave to US 27 and widening from Dykes to SW 196th (total cost estimate of \$49.4 million to \$93 million). The funding also included design of sidewalk installation at various locations in Pembroke Pines (total cost estimate of \$4.4 million). Both these projects are multiple year projects so they were included in the surtax's five (5) year plan for funding.

In addition, forty (40) municipal Rehabilitation and Maintenance (R & M) projects were funded for a total of \$56.7 million. This included resurfacing of NW 202 Ave and Johnson Street from NW 196th to NW 208th (cost estimate of \$484,000). The R&M project list will be opened every year for projects and those submitted will be ranked by the County.

Several months ago Broward County undertook a process to amend the Interlocal Agreement so that its language and requirements would confirm the work that was done for the initial review of projects, and to bolster many other subjects that the County believed needed updating. Due to the significant number of changes, the Second Amendment is proposed to be a Restatement of the original agreement, which means that in the future, reference will need to be made only to the Second Amendment.

Broward County advised that it would not proceed with any project-specific funding agreements for any eligible, ranked surtax projects until the Second Amendment is in effect. Representatives of the municipalities were involved in some of the discussions, and the final proposed document was received by the municipalities in early January, 2021. A chart showing the material changes to the Interlocal Agreement that are being made through the Second Amendment is attached hereto.

The MPO approved the Second Amendment on January 28, 2021.

As of the date of this memorandum, at least fifteen (15) municipalities have approved the Second Amendment, with those municipalities comprising more than fifty percent (50%) of the population of the County. Thus, there are sufficient municipal approvals for the Second Amendment to become effective once Broward County approves it.

Notwithstanding, the City Commission is being requested to approve the Second Amendment so that the City can be a signatory to the Second Amendment and confirm that the City is ready to accept and consider the project-specific funding agreements for the City's approved surtax properties.

By June 1 of every year, MPO must develop a ranked list of municipal capital projects to fund, a funding schedule for phases of ranked projects and allocations in the 5 year plan. MPO annually rank municipal capital projects, including new ones, and each one may be re-evaluated each year, and their rankings and funding may vary year-to-year.

Ranked Cycle 1 projects will retain their rankings for all phases of the project, and Cycle 1 projects shall retain their ranking unless deemed ineligible or withdrawn by municipality until all phases complete
