#### OPEN SECOND BUDGET PUBLIC HEARING

**BPH 21-0776** SECOND PUBLIC HEARING ON ADOPTING A TENTATIVE BUDGET AND PROPOSED MILLAGE RATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2021-2022 FOR THE CITY OF PEMBROKE PINES, FLORIDA.

> PURPOSE: RECOMPUTE AND PUBLICLY ANNOUNCE PROPOSED OPERATING MILLAGE RATE OF 5.6690, WHICH IS 4.34% ABOVE THE ROLLED-BACK MILLAGE RATE OF 5.4333, AND DEBT SERVICE MILLAGE RATE OF 0.4159, AS WELL AS AMEND AND ADOPT TENTATIVE BUDGET FOR GENERAL FUND, UTILITY FUND, AND ALL OTHER FUNDS OF THE CITY OF PEMBROKE PINES, AND INVITE THE PUBLIC TO SPEAK REGARDING THE PROPOSED MILLAGE AND BUDGET.

City Attorney Goren read the Second Budget Public Hearing Item into the record.

BH-1 2021-17 MOTION TO ADOPT PROPOSED ORDINANCE NO. 2021-17 ON SECOND AND FINAL READING.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF PEMBROKE PINES, FLORIDA, ESTABLISHING THE OPERATING MILLAGE RATE FOR THE CITY OF PEMBROKE PINES, FLORIDA, PURSUANT TO THE 2021-2022 CITY BUDGET, IN ACCORDANCE WITH CHAPTER 200, FLORIDA STATUTES; AND ESTABLISHING THE DEBT SERVICE MILLAGE RATE FOR DEBT SERVICE ON THE GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS APPROVED BY THE ELECTORATE; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CITY'S OPERATING MILLAGE RATE SHALL BE SET AT 5.6690, WHICH IS GREATER THAN THE ROLLED-BACK RATE OF 5.4333 MILLS BY 4.34%; AND THE PROPOSED DEBT SERVICE MILLAGE RATE IS 0.4159.

A motion was made by Commissioner Siple, seconded by Commissioner Schwartz, to adopt Proposed Ordinance 2021-17 on second and final reading, establishing the operating millage rate for the City of Pembroke Pines, pursuant to the 2021-2022 City Budget in accordance with Chapter 200 of the Florida Statutes; and establishing the debt service millage rate for debt service on the general obligation bonds approved by the electorate.

A motion was made by Commissioner Siple, seconded by Commissioner Schwartz, to direct the City Attorney's Office and the City Administration to take actions regarding legally authorized temporary and permanent limitations on the use of NW 4th Street, including the preparation of resolutions.

Assistant City Attorney Cirullo clarified that there would be two resolutions: one pertaining to temporary closure that would be road-specific; the other would also be road specific but would provide language that could be expanded to other locations in the City. The motion carried by the following vote:

PRIOR TO THE VOTE BEING TAKEN:

City Attorney Goren read SM-1 into the record by title. He explained that the item was a continuation of the discussion of Item 20 from the September 13, 2021, Regular Commission Meeting.

Mayor Ortis spoke about the Pembroke Road project being funded by the Broward Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), and that it was in process for completion with the County. Commissioner Siple explained the intent of the item which was not only to address traffic issues in West Pines for the residents, parents, and businesses but throughout the City, to explore options available to the Commission to address traffic congestion.

City Attorney Mike Cirullo addressed the Commission to provide background information pertaining to the roads in the City regarding state law, statutory regulations, interpretations of the law, and parameters that are based upon agreements the City had with the County; who controlled the traffic lights and other traffic management devices. Mr. Cirullo continued to explain whatever traditional or non-traditional options put into place on a temporary basis, must be submitted by way of a formal resolution to the County from the City Commission rather than requested by the City's Engineer, as required in the Inter-Local agreement. Mr. Cirullo also spoke on the City's enforcement component pursuant to Chapter 70 of the City's Code regarding fines and coordination with the Police Department.

City Attorney Goren said there had to be a legal mechanism to begin a discussion with the County to provide short-term options under the traffic engineering agreement with the County. Mr. Goren said an option could be a draft and adopt a resolution to begin or implement a conversation with the County and that it could be drafted and prepared for the October 6, 2021, Commission Meeting.

City Attorney Goren responded the purpose of the resolution would be to address the unique traffic issues amplified by COVID-19, to provide relief to the residents. The long-term traffic agreement would serve as the mechanism by way of a resolution to show the City's commitment to addressing the matter at hand in accordance with Chapter 316.008 of the Florida Statutes.

City Attorney Cirullo also responded that any feasible solutions could also be included in the resolution, to be submitted to the County.

City Manager Dodge responded to the questions of the Commission regarding recommendations for street closures that must go under legal review, NW 4th Street regarding enforcement issues, and about the discussions based upon feedback from the residents to close the road as a temporary or permanent solution. However, each of the options must be coordinated with the County according to the traffic code and regulations.

City Attorney Goren provided a response that all of the options are

available for the consideration of the Commission. The resolution would initiate the legal process of the conversation with the County to explore the options being proposed.
